In-Person Absentee Voting Through April 28

In-person absentee voting for the May 1 Town Election is available 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday – Friday (excluding holidays), **now through Saturday, April 28**. In-person absentee voting is available at the PWC Office of Elections’ main office, located at 9250 Lee Avenue, Manassas, or at their satellite office at the Woodbridge DMV, located at 2731 Caton Hill Road, Woodbridge.

The deadline for absentee ballot *by mail* is **5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 24, 2018**. Applications for a ballot to be mailed must be received by the PWC Office of Elections by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, April 24, 2018. Absentee ballot request forms are available on the Prince William County website at www.pwcgov.org/government/dept/vote.

All Town residents registered to vote are eligible to vote in the Town Election. **Polling Location:** Town Hall, 314 Mill Street, Occoquan, VA 22125

Town Election Day: May 1, 2018

The Mayor and Town Council members are elected at-large by the residents of Occoquan. All registered voters within the Town’s limits are eligible to vote during Town elections held on the first Tuesday of May during even-numbered years at Town Hall, 314 Mill Street. On May 1, 2018 Town residents will elect Mayor and five Councilmembers during the Town Election. Terms are for two years beginning July 1, 2018.

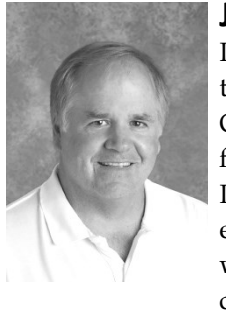
